From Year 4 - Year 8 all subjects are taught by teaching staff who teach only 1 or 2 subjects which ensures the ability to focus and specialise in their area.

Early Years Foundation Stage (Nursery Acorns and Oaks and Reception)

At Devonshire House Prep School, our Nursery provides the foundation for a lifelong love of learning, guided by the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Framework. We foster a nurturing environment where children feel secure, valued, and inspired to explore. Through a combination of adult-directed teaching and child-initiated learning, we foster holistic development in a supportive, engaging setting.

Prime Areas of Learning

We focus on three prime areas, forming the basis for future development:

- **Communication and Language**: Stories, songs, and conversations help children build listening, speaking, and understanding skills.
- Personal, Social, and Emotional Development: We nurture positive relationships, emotional resilience, and confidence in a caring environment.
- **Physical Development**: Learning activities like drawing, climbing, and running build motor skills, coordination, and healthy habits.

These are supported by four specific areas:

- **Literacy**: Early literacy skills are nurtured through Read Write Inc prephonics, reading, and pre-writing activities.
- **Mathematics**: Practical activities introduce concepts like numbers, shapes, and measurement.
- **Understanding the World**: Exploration of nature, technology, and cultures broadens children's awareness.



• **Expressive Arts and Design**: Creative activities encourage self-expression and problem-solving.

Play-Based and Child-Centred Learning

Our play-based approach encourages curiosity and independence. Children explore and initiate learning, supported by structured activities that extend their understanding. Teachers tailor teaching to individual needs, fostering both strengths and areas for growth to ensure every child thrives.

Reception

Continued development of the Prime Areas of Learning:

Reception remains part of the EYFS; therefore, it is in this year that pupils secure the Prime Areas of Development (as listed above). Although pupils continue to learn through play. This becomes gradually more structured and informal, play based learning gives way to a more formal approach ready for entry to Year 1. An example of this could be the reception class in three learning groups, two having an adult working on a Maths or English concept and one with a play task with a learning outcome. Towards the end of the reception year, you can expect to see an increase in whole class 'carpet time' and increased practice of organisation and independence.

Bespoke Phonics Provision:

At Devonshire House we use The Read Write Inc. (RWI) from Nursery and older. The RWI phonics program offers numerous benefits for children in Reception,

providing a strong foundation for early reading and writing. This structured approach systematically teaches children the sounds of letters and how to blend them, promoting phonemic awareness and decoding skills. RWI's interactive and engaging lessons make learning enjoyable, helping children develop a love for reading. The program also uses a multisensory approach which caters to different learning styles and reinforces concepts. The use of decodable books ensures that children practice reading with confidence, matching their phonics knowledge to real texts. Regular assessments allow for personalized learning, ensuring that children receive the support they need at their own pace. Overall, RWI equips Reception children with the necessary skills to become confident readers and writers, setting them up for future academic success. We continue to use this programme until our pupils can read fluently and have ample ability to decode any word they meet using their embedded phonetical knowledge.

Enhanced Stamina for Writing:



Building writing stamina helps our pupils stay focused and gradually write longer pieces. Start with short tasks (like labelling pictures) and slowly increase complexity. Offer varied writing opportunities, such as lists, stories, or simple sentences, and encourage children to see writing as purposeful, like creating class signs or notes. Strengthening fine motor skills through activities like playdough and scissors will also support writing development.

Deeper Mathematical Concepts:

In Reception, our mathematics goes beyond basic counting. Children will develop a solid understanding of numbers, patterns, and operations like addition and subtraction through hands-on activities. Introduce them to shapes, sizes, and measurements in practical ways, like sorting objects or building with blocks. Encourage mathematical language such as "more," "less," and "equal" in everyday contexts to deepen their understanding.

Key Stage One:

The Importance of Reading, Writing, and Maths in Years 1 and 2:

In Years 1 and 2, reading, writing, and mathematics form the foundational building blocks for all future learning. These core skills empower children to access and engage with the wider curriculum, fostering their ability to communicate effectively, solve problems, and develop critical thinking. By prioritising fluency in reading, confidence in writing, and a solid understanding of mathematical concepts, we ensure pupils are equipped with the essential tools they need to thrive academically and personally. A strong focus on these areas supports the development of lifelong learning habits and provides the basis for continued success in subsequent key stages.

A Broad and Balanced Curriculum

While reading, writing, and mathematics are central to early learning, we remain committed to delivering a knowledge rich and balanced curriculum that encompasses all subjects such as science, history, geography, art, music, and physical education which provide vital opportunities for children to apply and deepen their core skills in meaningful contexts. For example, pupils might use their writing skills to craft a report in history, apply mathematical knowledge in



science investigations, or interpret texts in geography. This integrated approach ensures that children not only build a strong academic foundation but also develop creativity, curiosity, and a lifelong love for learning.

Year 3:

Year 3 is an important and exciting time for our pupils. While it is a part of Key Stage Two, familiarity is important; the pupils will still have one class teacher for most subjects as in the Lower School and still benefit from the same specialist teachers in Music, Drama, French, Computing Technology and Sport. However, they are now based at our Middle School site which homes Year 3-5, giving Year 3 a more mature feel. Our Year 3 curriculum carefully balances the need to consolidate previous learning and move pupils forward. Our Year 3 team work closely with both Lower and Middle School Leaders to ensure pupils are ready for Year 4, academically and emotionally.

Key Stage Two and Three:

From Year 4, pupils have a form tutor which they will have daily time with. All other subjects are taught by teaching staff who teach only 1 or 2 subjects which ensures the ability to focus and specialise in their area.

Form Tutors

Our form tutors play a vital role in supporting pupils' overall well-being and academic progress. They are typically the first point of contact for pupils, parents, and families helping to foster a positive and supportive educational experience. The form tutor is responsible for monitoring attendance, behaviour, and academic performance within their form group. They also deliver pastoral care, providing guidance on personal and social issues, and may offer help with issues like bullying or friendships. Additionally, form tutors often lead morning registration sessions and ensure that students are prepared for lessons. They also communicate with other staff to address any concerns or provide additional support for students. Overall, the form tutor acts as a mentor and a key figure in a pupil's school life, promoting both academic and emotional development.

Subjects English

At Devonshire our English curriculum for Years 4 to 8 is designed to inspire a lifelong love of language, literature, and communication. We aim to equip pupils with the essential skills of reading, writing, speaking, and listening, enabling them to become confident, creative, and critical thinkers. Through a rich and diverse range of texts and experiences, we nurture pupils' ability to express themselves fluently and effectively, both orally and in writing.



At Devonshire House we:

- Develop strong foundational literacy skills that empower pupils to access all areas of the curriculum.
- Encourage a deep appreciation of literature from different cultures, periods, and perspectives.
- Foster a confident, articulate voice in pupils, supporting them to communicate ideas thoughtfully and persuasively.

Mathematics

Our Mathematics curriculum for Years 4 to 8 is designed to develop confident, curious, and resilient learners who see mathematics as both a practical tool and a fascinating subject in its own right. We aim to equip pupils with the essential knowledge and skills needed to solve problems, think logically, and reason mathematically.

At Devonshire House we:

Forest School

A subject leader's role is to design, monitor, and evaluate a coherent and ambitious curriculum for their subject, ensuring high-quality teaching, effective assessment, and progress for all learners while supporting and developing staff expertise.

The Deputy Head and Senior Deputy Head Curriculum's role is to lead the design, implementation, and evaluation of a cohesive, ambitious, and inclusive curriculum, ensuring it meets statutory requirements, supports outstanding teaching and learning, drives progress and achievement for all pupils, and fosters staff development through training, collaboration, and support.



The Headteacher's role is to set and communicate a clear vision for a broad, balanced, and ambitious curriculum, ensuring its effective implementation, monitoring its impact on pupil outcomes, and fostering a culture of high expectations and continuous improvement across the school.

The Governors' role is to provide strategic oversight by ensuring the curriculum is ambitious, inclusive, and meets statutory requirements, holding school leaders to account for its implementation, impact on pupil outcomes, and support for staff development.

Celebrate cultural diversity and fosters deep cultural understanding. Through our Religious Education curriculum, pupils learn both about and from different religions, developing respect for varied beliefs whilst having opportunities to celebrate their own faith traditions.

Our vibrant international school community enriches daily learning, with pupils sharing diverse cultural perspectives and experiences. We maintain a wide calendar of celebrations including Diwali, Thanksgiving, and festivals from multiple traditions, enabling children to appreciate global cultures firsthand.

This inclusive approach ensures pupils develop cultural awareness, respect for difference, and a strong sense of their place within our diverse, interconnected world.

Assessment

All pupils are continuously assessed throughout their learning journey at Devonshire House.

Assessment of Learning is a summative evaluation that measures what pupils have learned at the end of a period of teaching, providing a judgement of their achievement against specific standards or learning objectives. Assessment of learning could include:

- End of unit/topic tests
- Termly/half-termly standardised assessments
- End of year examinations
- Baseline assessments
- End of project presentations or performances
- Informal classroom techniques such as cold calling, exit tickets, thumbs up or down.

Assessment for Learning is formative assessment that takes place during the teaching process to identify pupils' current understanding, inform next steps in teaching, and guide pupils' progress towards learning goals. Assessment for learning could include the above points and:

- Daily questioning and dialogue
- Low stakes quizzes



- Observation during lessons and play
- Marking and feedback on work
- Self-assessment and peer assessment

This comprehensive programme ensures every child discovers their passions and develops well-rounded skills for life.

- Creativity clubs such as film, Lego, craft and art scholars.
- Sports clubs, for example football, netball, judo and ballet.
- Music lessons including various bands such as brass and jazz and ensemble groups.
- Dance clubs and an opportunity to participate in London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art (LAMDA)
